- **I.** Review of 6-3-13 Minutes
 - A. Delay review to 9-30-13 meeting
- II. Process
 - A. AcA can approve, disapprove, or modify and approve the Program Review Committee memo recommending termination of the German minor
 - B. Concern that current procedures are inadequate for thorough suspension/termination review
- III. Recommended Termination of German Program
 - A. Program director's response (Cordula Brown)
 - 1. Errors in enrollment numbers listed in dean's memo
 - a. German 125 course had 25 members, not 9 as the dean said
 - b. German 315 was offered only once, but it was offered cross-listed with a film studies course
 - c. 4 students in Winter guarter 2012 this course wasn't offered in this guarter
 - 2. German study abroad has low numbers but it does not pertain to the German minor program
 - 3. Program contributes to mission and strategic plan
 - a. Diversity provides another minor opportunity for students in natural sciences
 - b. Global engagement ability to connect with culture through knowledge of language, enhanced time abroad
 - c. Academic excellence many graduate subjects require German; adversely affects the ability to study primary source research material in history, philosophy, art
 - d. This year two German students are Fulbright scholars, heightening the profile of the university
 - 4. Notification Process
 - a. Email from dean inviting faculty member to a meeting with no subject
 - b. No prior notification from or discussion with department chair
 - c. No attempt to work with program director to address challenges
 - d. Maria Carl, chair of curriculum committee of Arts and Sciences was not notified of the program termination
 - B. Department response (Victor Reinking)
 - 1. All previous deans recommended terminating the German minor
 - 2. Process for determining termination
 - a. Kan Liang attended a department meeting and presented the 5% budget cut
 - b. German was decided upon because it had been slated for cuts, low enrollment, and problems with second year
 - c. Department presented three options to the dean, who made the final decision
 - 3. Discussion of process

- a. Termination would not have been proposed if not presented with the budget cut, was not part of strategic planning process as recommended last year by Program Review Committee
- b. Dean, not department, made the final decision
- c. Issue was not revisited after the budget cut was reduced and funds were reallocated back to the college under an unclear process
- C. Program Review Committee Memo
 - 1. Recommended a phased program termination with reservations, since several members were conflicted
 - 2. Also recommended college develop strategic planning that would ensure budget does not motivate program suspensions or terminations
- D. Dean's response (David Powers)
 - 1. Budget cut process
 - a. Dean submitted 5% budget cut to Provost's Office
 - b. Provost's Office returned a list of which recommendations they supported
 - c. Total budget cut for Arts and Sciences was about 1.5% of the college's budget
 - 2. Mission, strategic plan and programming concerns
 - a. Original plan was to follow the recommendation of PRC and AcA to track enrollments in Modern Languages for three years and develop a strategic plan
 - b. However, the program review process does not specifically address concerns with minor programs within a department, so German was not specifically addressed in the program review process
 - 3. Discrepancy in enrollment numbers
 - a. Numbers were the highest and lowest enrollment on May 31 of each year
 - b. Minor data is difficult to measure because often students don't sign up for minors until the end of their time at SU
 - 4. Agree with the need for a more comprehensive college strategic plan
- E. Letter from faculty staff assembly of A&S
 - 1. Currently examining college governance structure in relationship to university governance
 - 2. Faculty Staff Assembly is not structured as a regular governance body with proportionate representation, and lacks the decision-making authority of the Executive Committee
- **IV.** Program Termination Process
 - A. Reallocation seems unfair
 - 1. Modern Languages proposed German cut after the 5% budget cut mandate, because there was nothing else to propose
 - 2. Dean presented German termination to Provost, who supported that decision and chose to reallocate funds to other areas as well as support new budget requests
 - 3. Does not seem like a comprehensive process was followed to make the cut, seems rushed and non-reflective
 - B. Stakeholders including students and faculty were not involved in decision
 - C. Although the Modern Languages department has over 20 members, only 4 faculty vote
 - D. PRC working on program suspension/termination form
