

Sample Syllabus Statements

- 1) Support for Students with Disabilities: If you have, or think you may have, a disability (including an "invisible disability" such as a learning disability, a chronic health problem, or a mental health condition) that interferes with your performance as a student in this class, you are encouraged to arrange support services and/or accommodations through Disability Services staff located in Loyola 100, (206) 296-5740. Disability-based adjustments to course expectations can be arranged only through this process.
- 2) Access and Accommodations: Your experience in this class is important to me. If you have already established accommodations with Disability Services (DS), please communicate your approved accommodations to me at your earliest convenience so we can discuss your needs in this course.
 - If you have not yet established services through DS but have a temporary health condition or permanent disability that requires accommodations (conditions include but not limited to; mental health, attention-related, learning, vision, hearing, physical or health impacts), you are welcome to contact DS at 206-296-5740 or DS@seattleu.edu. DS determines reasonable accommodations for students with disabilities and/or temporary health conditions. Reasonable accommodations are established through an interactive process between you, your instructor(s), and DS. It is the policy and practice of Seattle University to create inclusive and accessible learning environments consistent with federal and state law.
- 3) Access: Seattle University values diverse types of learners and is committed to ensuring that each student is afforded an equal opportunity to participate in learning experiences. If you have (or think you may have) a disability including a mental health, medical, or physical impairment– that would impact your educational experience in this class, please contact the Disability Services (DS) office to schedule an intake meeting.
