## **In-Country Partners**

SU does not have stand-alone lawful presence to operate a program in foreign countries. Therefore, program leaders are expected to reasonably investigate and follow local host-country law regarding the employing the services of licensed, bonded, and insured partners and entities including: tour guides, businesses, non-governmental organizations, educational organizations, etc.

When contracting service providers, services should be outlined in an agreement, contract, or detailed invoice. Considerations regarding hiring of local service providers include:

- Lawfully hiring locals ensuring that workers compensation, social security, and income tax equivalents are provided according to host country law
- Adhere to local laws, regulations, and standards including local tax laws
- Secure liability insurance as the local law requires
- Sponsorship of SU faculty and students for lawful visas during the duration of the program
