Sponsored Project Highlight

Seattle U School of Law awarded Law School Admission Council grant to create pathways to law school for Latinx and Indigenous students

Congratulations to the School of Law, under the direction of Dean Annette Clark, who led an effort to secure a grant for a program that aims to diversify the legal profession. Funded by a Law School Admission Council (LSAC) Prelaw Undergraduate Scholars (PLUS) Program grant, the Washington Law

Schools-Heritage University Collaborative-An LSAC PLUS Program is a partnership between Washington's three law schools – Seattle University, University of Washington (UW), and Gonzaga University – and Heritage University, a private undergraduate rural college in Toppenish, Washington, near Yakima, and one of only two universities in the nation designated as both a Hispanic-Serving Institution and a Native American-Serving Non-Tribal Institution. The Collaborative aims to make a law degree more accessible to Heritage's diverse Latinx and Indigenous students from the historically underserved Central Washington region by breaking down obstacles and creating a pathway to law school.

The Collaborative's primary element will be an intensive, three-week summer program that will take place in June 2022 on Heritage University's campus. Key aspects are designed to help students envision themselves as lawyers, with a visit by several Washington Supreme Court justices, a mock law school class, roundtable discussions with leaders of minority bar associations, and modules that provide helpful information to demystify the application process and the law school experience. Students may also visit one of the Washington law schools. A shorter, follow-up program component will take place in October. Students who complete the program will receive a stipend.

The Collaborative was also developed in partnership with several legal services organizations, which first identified the critical and longstanding need for more homegrown lawyers drawn from Washington state. These organizations – which include Northwest Justice Project, Northwest Immigrant Rights Project, Columbia Legal Services, TeamChild, and the Benefits Law Center – will be integrally involved in designing and implementing the pipeline program. They will also help provide the critically important connection to the practicing bar, as well as insights on the access to justice gap in rural communities and the urgent need for lawyers who are more representative of their clients and communities.

Congratulations again to the School of Law, Dean Clark, and their many partners and collaborators for securing funding for this innovative and important program! As Dean Clark notes, "Historically, Central Washington does not have sufficient lawyers, particularly racially and ethnically diverse lawyers, to serve the legal needs of its people and the community." The new partnership enabled by this grant will "expand these students' horizons and make a legal career an achievable goal. This will also help address the critical shortage of diverse lawyers in the region, thus enhancing access to justice for the clients and communities they will serve."

SU Policy Updates

Reminder: Current Travel Policy

A reminder that, effective November 24, 2021, the university's <u>updated travel policy</u> permits all fully-vaccinated SU faculty and staff to travel for SU-related purposes, including for research. All travelers must follow CDC guidelines on <u>domestic</u> and <u>international</u> travel, as well as state-, country-, and airline-specific requirements. All faculty and staff returning from University-related or personal travel must also complete the <u>Safe Start Health Check</u>.

Reminder: Distinguishing between Gifts and Grants

Is the funding you received or are seeking a gift or grant? OSP commonly receives questions like this from faculty and staff wondering how to distinguish between a gift or a grant. In short: If the funding requires detailed financial reporting or expects completion of specific tasks or deliverables, it is likely a grant. If the funding is provided in support of a particular program, but not tied to particular expenses and with no expectation of detailed reporting, it may be a gift. These are just a few of the factors considered as part of the 'checklist' used to determine funding type. If there are any question as to

whether funding is a gift or grant, please **contact OSP** so that we can ensure proper stewardship regardless of the type of funding.

Sponsor Policy Updates and Resources

National Science Foundation (NSF) Policy Updates

Fall Virtual NSF Grants Conference – Materials Available: Recordings and slides from the NSF annual conference held October 4-8 are now available here. Sessions that could be of particular interest to SU faculty include presentations by Program Officers of the following Directorates: Biological Sciences, Social, Behavioral and Economic Sciences, Education and Human Resources, Computer and Information Science and Engineering, Mathematical and Physical Sciences, and Engineering. Sessions on Proposal Preparation and Merit Review Process may also be of interest.

Research.gov Updates: NSF continues to expand the types of proposals that can be submitted through the **Research.gov** portal (latest **here**) and has announced that its old grant submission and management portal, Fastlane, will be closed December 31, 2022. In anticipation of this date, all prospective NSF investigators are encouraged to submit via Research.gov when possible!

National Institutes of Health (NIH) Updates

New grant application forms required effective: The NIH has released their new grant application forms ("FORMS-G"), which are required for all submissions with due dates on or after January 25th. Grants submitted prior to that date must use FORMS-G. More details are <u>here</u>.
